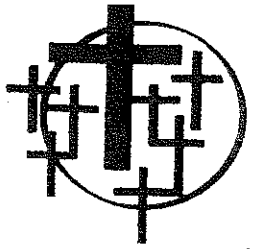

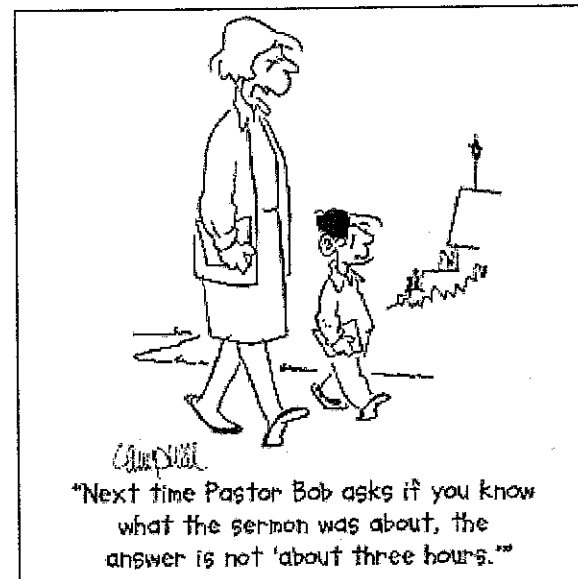

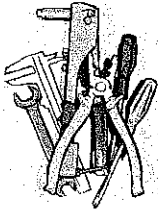
Do you have an anniversary in the month of January? We don't have anybody on record yet. Somebody **has** to have an anniversary in November! How about December? Call the office and let us know.

We are still waiting for donations for the parsonage bathroom project. The projected cost of the remodel is \$5000. We already have 2 vanity cabinets and need to purchase the rest of the cupboards, we have a bathtub, 1 door, and 2 sinks, so we've got the project a little off the ground. We need 2x4's, flooring boards, electrical supplies, plumbing supplies, wall board, joint compound, paint, mirrors, light fixtures, nails, screws, tile, adhesive, grout, baseboard, faucets, shower head and faucet, shower door, a pocket door, carpet to match the other carpet, and other smaller items. We will be tearing the floor out to the joists as we did with the kitchen, walls down to studs, move walls and doorways, and put in new electric wiring and plumbing. We are investing in property we already own and adding to the value of the house, not to mention that it will be a lot better bathroom. ## Flower Chart

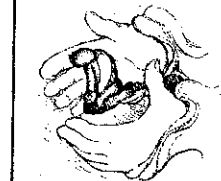

# TOOLS FOR LIVING

## STEP 3

"Made the decision to turn our will and our lives over to the care of God as we understood Him."

Step 3 culminates a process begun in Steps 1 and 2. In Step 1, we admitted our lives were out of control and that we were powerless to change things through our own power. In Step 2, we renounced every old god we had been worshiping as powerless to save us and looked to a higher Power to restore us to wholeness. In Step 3, we recognize God as that higher Power and ask Him to assume control over and care of every aspect of our lives.

A common recovery phrase used Twelve Step groups in "Turn it over." For the recovering person, which means turning over to God's care not only the major, conspicuous addictions like alcoholism. It means turning over every aspect of life, even the small frustrations involved in handling children or trying to make a faulty appliance work or dealing with congested freeway traffic. In the face of these irritations, the recovering person will say time and time again, "Turn it over; turn it over; turn it over."

A Step 3 recovery paradox is that codependent or addictive personalities are often quite willful and egocentric, and yet that egocentricity often camouflages a deep sense of insecurity. In A. A. 's oral tradition, an alcoholic or codependent is defined as being "an egomaniac with an inferiority complex." Step 3 invites us to get out of the center of our universe and hand that place back to God. As we move into any addiction or dependency, we tend to become more self-centered, self-absorbed, and self-preoccupied in trying to address the pain driving the addiction. Paradoxically, this self-preoccupation only draws us more deeply into the addiction. We become more self-centered and self-preoccupied as we seek to address the pain, yet self-preoccupation itself creates more pain, loneliness, and isolation. The addiction pulls us more deeply into its pain cycle. In order to surmount the pain cycle, ultimately we must step out of ourselves and look beyond ourselves.

Breaking out of this bondage of self does not mean we ignore or deny our needs. In fact, quite the reverse is true. If we can discover healthy, God-directed ways to meet our emotional and physical needs, then we become less needy, less selfish, less self-preoccupied individuals. This is another recovery paradox. Discovering what our needs are and asking to have those needs met may be one of the most unselfish things we do. All of us have needs, and all of us have choices as to how those needs are to be met. Addictions, compulsions, and co dependencies are counterfeit means of trying to meet our most basic physical, emotional, and spiritual hungers. With God's help we can find genuine ways of satisfying them.

We want to turn ourselves over to God, but how? How do we get out of the driver's seat? The key is willingness. If we crack the door just a little bit, then God will direct us in the process. Revelation 3:20 says: "Behold, I stand at the door and knock. If anyone hears My voice and opens the door, I will come in to him and dine with him, and he with Me."

A.A. 's Third Step Prayer is an excellent way to formalize our commitment to this new willingness: "God, I offer myself to Thee—to build with me and to do with me as Thou wilt. Relieve me of the bondage of self, that I may better do Thy will. Take away my difficulties, that victory over them may bear witness to those I would help of Thy power, Thy love, and Thy way of life. May I do Thy will always." (Alcoholics Anonymous, pg. 63)

In Russia there are many out of work and running to alcohol. There is much sadness in the world and even here in the U.S. I ask you again, where is your gladness?

Jesus Christ alone is the source of all gladness. To paraphrase Psalm 45:7, it says, "Only those who press in to a closer walk with Jesus obtain the joy of His Spirit." Isaiah 51:12-13 talks about God asking us why we have forgotten about Him. Reminding us of what He has done and that he still is our deliverer, that no one can harm us (spiritually) because He holds us in the palm of His hand.

God has blessed us with both the love and fear of God and His will for us is to obtain His joy and gladness. We are to be a people, despite the things happening around us, to have a song of joy in our hearts. A joy that lasts until the very end. It does not mean our suffering will end but such things will not rob us of our joy and gladness in Christ.

Isaiah 25:1 says that God's guidance is coming to us. Trust in that. No matter what or where, the joy of Christ and His love, His forgiveness, His everlasting life, is in the middle of it. Jesus is a strength to the poor and needy, a refuge from the storm. Jesus is our protector and our defense. No storm can take that away.

As we go to our knees in prayer, we are feasting at His table of gladness and peace. To gain the true joy of gladness in Christ as an individual and as a church it is about going to prayer and waiting on the Lord. He will save us because we are within His walls. Proverbs 10:28 "The Hope of the righteous shall be gladness." Keep His eternal values in view. Look beyond where we are at, to the glories of Heaven.

Isn't it strange how everyone wants a place in heaven, but they don't want to believe, do, or say anything to get there?

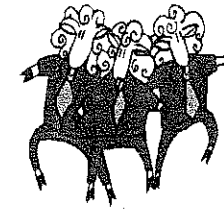
Isn't it strange how we send jokes in e-mails and they are forwarded right away, but when we are going to send messages about God, we think about it twice before we share it with others?
